Parliamentary Friends of Landcare Event

Earlier this month, Landcarers, Bushcarers, students and parliamentarians gathered at the Coal Loader Centre for Sustainability in Sydney to celebrate the positive impact of city and country volunteers.

This event was the first reciprocal visit, with a group of 50 children, farmers and Landcarers from Boorowa making the 670km round trip to plant native species in a precious area of bushland on Sydney Harbour.

Building Bridges to Boorowa is a successful partnership that has achieved remarkable results. Over 50,000 trees have been planted on more than 40 properties in the Boorowa region creating benefits for local and migratory wildlife (including threatened species such as the Superb Parrot).

Without the support of these city volunteers, planting on this scale would be difficult and costly.

The event included a conversation between two long term participants in the partnership – farmer Steve Jarvis and Bushcare volunteer Sissy Stewart – facilitated by the Hon Katrina Hodgkinson MP, chair of the NSW Parliamentary Friends of Landcare.

For the NSW Parliamentary Friends of Landcare (PFL) the event was an opportunity to see firsthand how Landcare is helping local communities. The PFL continues a longstanding tradition of bipartisan support Landcare has enjoyed since it started nearly 30 years ago. The next PFL event will be *Trees in the House* a cocktail party held in Parliament House in November.

NSW Minister & new LLS Chair express support for Landcare



The NSW Minister for Primary Industries, the Hon Niall Blair, and the new Acting Chair of Local Land Services, Richard Bull, both attended the May Council meeting held in Sydney on 16th May.

The Minister has portfolio responsibility for the NSW Local Landcare Coordinator Initiative and is central to shaping the future of Landcare in this State.

Minister Blair allocated an hour for the visit but ended up staying for two, engaging in a genuine, open dialogue and impressing the endorsed Landcare representatives from around the State with his knowledge and understanding of the issues.

Landcare NSW Chair Rob Dulhunty opened the discussion by thanking the Minister for the NSW

Councillors also talked about some of the challenges. For example, the success of the Landcare Coordinator Initiative program has led to growing interest from communities to participate in Landcare projects and activities, however the explosion in Landcare activities is making meeting community demands more difficult for the part-time coordinators and voluntary committees to manage. The clear message from Councillors around the table was the program is making a difference; with strong support for the program to be maintained and further expanded.

The Minister took a keen interest in the local reports from Councillors and expressed his 'absolute commitment to Landcare'.

The new Acting Chair of Local Land Services, Richard Bull, engaged in in-depth discussions with Councillors. Richard Bull is a member of Holbrook Landcare and has a thorough understanding of the importance of a healthy Landcare movement. Richard is keen to work closely with Landcare at the State level through the Joint Management Committee which he cochairs with Rob Dulhunty and at the regional level in the Murray. He will be spending a considerable amount of time travelling and plans to meet with local Landcare wherever possible.

Government's support for Landcare.

All Councillors had the opportunity to have their say, and a consistent message was that Local Landcare Coordinators, coupled with expanded state support, are having a positive impact and Landcare is undergoing a revival. For example, in the West of the State the number of groups has gone from 6 to 22 and five more are under development, creating a network across a vast area that can be used for integrated activities such as pest management.

Landcare NSW views the NSW Government as our key partner and we are currently seeking continued funding and support for Landcare in NSW, however we are also working to diversify our revenue and funding so we are not solely reliant on Government.

Minister Blair agreed, 'Landcare shouldn't live or die depending on what happens on Budget day'.

Firstly a **thank you** to all the host organisations and coordinators out there who are not only supporting their local communities to achieve great outcomes, but are very importantly **contributing to the case for ongoing support** by providing case studies, completing reporting and participating in regional communities of practice.

Regardless of the support that is provided by Landcare NSW and Local Land Services through the LLCI it really is *your* efforts that will make all the difference to being able to show how important a supported Landcare is.


We now have over 170 case studies that can be used not only by groups for their own purposes; Landcare NSW utilises these in its marketing and representational efforts. The better you tell your stories the better we can tell the story of Landcare in NSW - so keep up the good work! Check out the ever growing library of case studies here.

The results of Report Card 1 are now being analysed and whilst we have yet to get a full picture as the census is not complete, some early results are helping us understand what Landcare is and looks like across NSW. We recognise that this only covers the LLCI supported groups and we have a long way to go to capture the complete picture – but we now have a methodology that allows for this - that can be aggregated to the Regional scale, or selected by Landcare Region or Local Land Services Region.


Community of Practice

2nd State-wide LLCI "get together"


Under the LLCI three State-wide "get-togethers" are included to help build the cohesion of Landcare support across NSW. The first event, held at Stockton in March 2016, laid the foundation for the LLCI; the second event, which was due to be held in Nov this year has been bought forward to 21 June 17 and will be run as a regionally based webinar. This decisions was made so as free up budget resources to allow greater attendance by coordinators/hosts at the State Landcare and Local Land Services Conference to be held in late October. 
Type of Group

Sustaining Landcare -

Membership and Insurance Update

At last count we had 131 groups take advantage of the Insurance program offered by Landcare NSW. What has arisen out of the program and LLCI reporting is the high number of unincorporated groups that exist – and, as these groups have no legal entity, it is in fact impossible for these groups to take out a membership or gain insurance in their own name. We have been working with district networks, local government and others to look at how we can ensure these groups are supported and protected whilst undertaking their landcare activities. Trust Progress Update

Progress against the Proposed Model for the Sustaining Landcare Trust Project is progressing well. Phase 1 of the project is now complete and Phase 2 is close to completion. Of the 20 recommendations presented in the Model, work has been completed or is well advanced on three quarters The business case for building and enacting the necessary infrastructure is being presented to the NSW Government, to enable progression to Phases 3 & 4 which will see marketing and fundraising begin in earnest, as well as improving the infrastructure that supports your group.

The Gerald Carnie Memorial Award

Carnie Memorial Award. The award will go to an individual in recognition of their contribution to the development of "the philosophy of Landcare" at the bi-annual NSW State Landcare Conference being held in Albury.

In June 2011, Gerald Carnie, a committed Landcarer from the Parkes area, died suddenly at the age of 46, leaving his wife Lorraine and sons, Ryan and Jarrod, grieving and the Landcare community shocked.

The Gerald Carnie Memorial Award for Keeping the Landcare Flame Alive was established by Landcare NSW to recognise this very special individual's contributions to the Landcare movement

The recipient will champion the development of Landcare as a means to support and engender change in attitudes, which translates to a more cohesive and resilient community that acts to achieve a healthier environment and/or more productive and sustainable farms. Applicants will be judged on the impact they have had at the local AND regional or state scale to ensure that Landcare can prosper.

Landcare NSW Regional Scale Events Support Fund





Landcare NSW has secured funding, through NSW Environmental Trust, to build the skills, knowledge and capability of Landcare members across the state to participate in NRM decision making at all scales and levels.

One of the activities of the funded project is to support regional scale events across NSW between now and May 2018, through which the objectives of the program can be delivered.

Many regions already hold regional scale forums or events, so this funding is not to run additional activities but to enhance existing ones through the inclusion of capacity and partnership development sessions. There is \$2,500 (GST exc) available for each region, to contribute to the costs of running the event. There is approximate allocation of \$500 for trainer /



To date three regions have run events supported through this program:

The **Central West Partnership Forum**, held in Dubbo in February focused on developing partnership skills and introducing Landcarers to a range of program providers who worked together to develop potential partnerships.

- 75% of participants have new project ideas
- 90% of participants made 3 or more new contacts on the day
- 87% of participants have followed up with new contacts made on the day.

The **South East Landcare Muster**, and Regional Community of Practice event was held


NSW Landcare Honour Roll

Our Members Council has established monthly catch-ups by telephone, which are proving to be a great way of sharing information and giving feedback on the various issues of interest to We have however been given strong assurance that community Landcare is seen as an important part of this process and that information will be provided to the NLN and its members as soon as it is available. The NLN is also continuing to work closely with Landcare Australia to explore ways for the two

Landcare which are cropping up at the national level at the moment. The essential role that the Council plays in linking the NLN with the Landcare community is increasingly being recognised by national decision-makers, and is the real strength of our organisation. The NLN Board gathered from across the country in Canberra on 23rd - 24th May, and was fortunate to be able to meet with the Minister for the Environment and Energy Josh Frydenberg, as well as staff from his department and the Department of Agriculture and Water Resources. This gave us an opportunity to discuss the recent budget announcement and its implications for Landcare, including the allocation of the \$100 million for Landcare secured by the Greens through negotiations with the Government late last year. Work is still ongoing to determine the detail of how funds will be allocated, and what the design process for the next iteration of the National Landcare Programme will be.
