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# Introduction

Regional Australia Bank (formerly Community Mutual) partnered with Landcare NSW for their e-statement campaign. For every customer that switched to receiving their statements electronically, Landcare NSW receives \$1.

This support the activities of local Landcare groups in the operating area of Regional Australia Bank to undertake their environmental conservation, education and sustainable agriculture projects.

The partnership has been running since 2013. During the 2013-14 period 4 projects were supported. This report covers the use of funds received and allocated during the 2014-2015 period. These projects have now been completed and are outlined in this report.

Landcare NSW and the local Landcare groups involved in 2014/16 would like to thank Regional Australia Bank for their on-going support.

## **Devolved Funding Method**

For the 2014-2015 distribution, funds were devolved to worthy Landcare group projects through the following method.

- 1. Availability of the Regional Australia Bank funding was promoted to all Landcare Groups in the areas where Regional Australia Bank have a branch.
- 2. Interested groups were asked to complete a brief project application form (Attachment 1), including a description of their project and the funding required, among other details.
- 3. Funds were granted to the projects that showed wide community involvement in the activity.
- 4. Projects were funded in priority order until all funding was allocated.

In total, \$6557.27 (ex GST was received, this was distributed to 7 projects. Unfortunately one project did not proceed and the funds for this have been held back to include in next year's distribution process.

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## Regent Honey Eater Report 2015



Recently, Congewai Valley Landcare Inc received a small grant of \$1500 to use for establishment of further habitat for the critically endangered Regent Honey Eater.

This medium sized bird used to be prolific along the East Coast but with habitat disappearing numbers have diminished and breeding colonies reduced to only a few sites. Cessnock LGA is lucky to be one of those areas, and Congewai Valley runs south from the main colony areas. With the money received from Community Mutual Group and Hunter Region Landcare the group has planted small areas of suitable trees on four different properties, leading away from the main breeding areas.

Suitable tree species were determined and Max Elliott (Grow Local – Cessnock Region Native plants) contracted to germinate and grow out the selected species. A lead time of some 5-6 months was needed for him to complete this preparatory work.

A local Landcare meeting was held to allow members to learn of this particular bird, with the main presentation being given by Mick Roderick (Birds Australia). The history, habitats and behaviours were discussed along with some other relevant facts about the area and other local birds. At the meeting it was obvious that a number of locals are passionate about the bird populations of the valley, and regularly observe the different populations around the properties.

Volunteer sites for the Regent Honey Eater project were sought, with guidelines stating that areas needed to be able to accommodate 125 trees, of varying species, be safely fenced from stock at least until trees are of a size able to survive contact with them. The possible sites were inspected by the committee, and preparations conducted by the owners, to allow plantings in April 2015.

Planting days were relaxed and social with many hands making quick work of the task. Three days in total were needed and each day ended with some tasty morsels and friendly chatting! Luckily the weather has been kind since planting, and there has been regular small amounts of rain so landholders have not had to water the plants that much, and they seem to all be growing well.

We look forward to seeing much more of this rather pretty local bird over coming years, and thank all who supported us. The tree species ;planted in this project were

- Corymbia maculata (Spotted Gum)Casuarina cunninghamiana (River Oak)
- Casual na culturinghamana (ruver Oa
- Euc. amplifolia (Cabbage Gum)
- Euc. tereticornis (Forest Red Gum)Euc. fibrosa (Broad-leaved Ironbark)
- Euc. moluccana (Grey Box)
- Angophora floribunda (Rough-barked Apple)
- Euc. agglomerata (Kurri) (Stringybark)
- Euc. punctata (Grey Gum)



Postscript : another small grant has been received and will be used to establish several more sites further up the valley.

Saturday 13th of December from 10am until 1pm.

We have chosen some of our favourite local weeds to focus on and have access to a fine display of Privet, Tree of Heaven, and Blackberry and just for a little variety, Japanese Honeysuckle.

A variety of control techniques will be discussed and demonstrated on the day, including how best to tackle large infestations or just isolated plants.

We have invited Barry Shepherd, Cessnock Councils Weed Control Officer, who will concentrate on chemical control using knapsack sprayers. Barry will cover the recommended types of herbicide for specific species as well as different ways of applying the herbicide, e.g. as a foliage spray or as a basal spray.

As much of our weed control occurs near creek lines, issues like water contamination and erosion control will also be covered on the day. We hope to cover most of your issues and concerns through practical demonstrations, rather than just talking about them.

The weeds mentioned above are just a starting point. Please feel free to discuss your particular favourite, bring along samples of plants/weeds you may want help identifying. If you have techniques that you have found successful please let us know.

The workshop will be held on Tony Palfreeman's property which is on Payne's Crossing Road about half a kilometre north of Wollombi (towards Broke) Parking will be available in the paddock just past Cuneens Bridge. Lookout for the Landcare signs.

This workshop, and associated follow up weed control of the site, is being made possible through funding support from the Community Mutual Group and Hunter Local Land Services, the day is the result of a partnership between Wollombi Valley Landcare, Cessnock City Council, the Hunter Regional Landcare Network and Landcare NSW.

Your attendance will support us as we continue the revitalisation of Landcare in your local area, district and region.

# Farm Gate Tour

#### Showcasing diverse enterprises in the lower Manning Valley.

#### The issue

Manning Landcare developed a community, social farming event to bring people together. The Manning Valley has many enterprising producers, many on small landholdings. These landholders have interesting and varied systems producing products that are mostly sold locally. These ventures often struggle to raise awareness of their business within the local community and find marketing their products time consuming and costly. The Valley also has a high rate of new landowners buying land, most coming from non-farming backgrounds, yet with production expectations of their new land. By introducing them to Landcare through this event we created a mindfulness of best practice and where to turn to for information. The Farm Gate Tour offers:

- Current enterprises can raise awareness of their products, production values and add to their customer base, including an opportunity to offer samples/taste tests and to sell product.
- For Tour goers it gives people the opportunity to visit, observe and interact with current enterprises. To try and buy local products, supporting local farming networks, while enjoying a self drive experience round a beautiful part of the Manning Valley

#### The solution

Our aim was to provide these producers with the opportunity to open their properties to the public. T o showcase their business and products and to promote best practice land management techniques and t o connect members of the public with small enterprise farming & Landcare.

We approached producers in one area of the Manning Valley, the Lower Manning - from Glenthorne to the Mitchells Island, to gauge interest in the idea. Four family enterprises were extremely keen to participate. Manning Landcare worked with the landholders to plan for the tour, how to accommodate numbers, traffic control, signage, and more. A double sided flyer was developed with a brief description of each farm, the address and details for food, stops and more. These flyers were printed and distributed through the rural mail in the surrounding areas. Local papers were notified and the flyer was shared to many relevant Group Facebook pages and to local Clubs of all sorts.

#### The impact

The Farm Gate Tour was held on the Saturday the 30th of May 2015. Our 4 farms were delighted with the attendance, the interest of participants, contact details collected and product sold. Manning Landcare ran a BBQ and information stall at Island in the Stream Worm Farm, both Landcare co-ordinators were in attendance to answer questions and assist with pamphlets, brochures and books.

## Landcare NSW – Pozible Crowd-Funding Training Workshops

Landcare NSW worked with Landcare networks to host a crowdfunding workshop in their region.

The funding from Community Mutual allowed Landcare NSW to provide trainers to assist groups to learn how they can widen their net on potential funding for their projects. Four workshops were run across the state culminating in 15 projects submitted to the launch of the Pozible Landcare partnership at the National Landcare Conference in September 2014. The event was run with the assistance of Southern New England and attracted a wide range of groups including Landcare from across the region, and other community based organisations in the Armidale region.
