LABOR TO PROVIDE BOOST TO LANDCARE AND TARGET NOXIOUS WEEDS

A Foley Labor Government will provide \$20 million to support the work of Landcare as a partner in improving our natural landscape, enhancing agricultural productivity and protecting biodiversity.

The \$20 million over four years for Landcare will allow the organisation to act independently of government agencies with the resources needed to pursue professional development, policy, research, monitoring and evaluation. The funding will also facilitate Landcare's partnerships with Aboriginal communities.

The investment in Landcare is part of Labor's comprehensive strategy to provide regional and rural communities with the tools they need to protect the assets they manage.

Labor's plan also includes the restoration of the Natural Resource Commission as a respected leader in scientifically based resource management and environment protection; a focus on building bush corridors across landscapes to improve ecological connectivity; and rebuilding the governance model for Local Land Services.

Labor will also implement a 'permitted list approach' to weeds and will retain a regional weeds committee structure consistent with the recommendations of the weeds report.
