## Logan Zingus Speech to Parliamentary Friends of Landcare 10 May 2016

I am extremely excited about the opportunities in our region. I'm thrilled to be able to bring my knowledge of state and national priorities to help align local action, and support landholders in accessing resources and services.

I'm also very keen to engage young people through the many schools in our valley, improve our appeal to tourists through enhancing our natural spaces, and work with our other Landcare groups

in my region and across the state, and Local Land Services to share ideas, and collaborate on delivering innovative extension and community building programmes.

I joined the public service because I wanted to be part of something bigger than myself by improving our environment and production landscapes. Through my position as Local Landcare Coordinator at Nambucca Valley, which has been made possible by funding from the NSW State Government, I truly feel that I can follow my passion and contribute to my community as part of a movement with an inspiring history and a very exciting future.
